UTHANDO PROJECT FOR TEACHERS

We are delighted as more schools participate in the Uthando Project each year, regarding it as meaningful and worthwhile. By engaging students in a compassionate activity outside of 'self' addresses values sometimes overlooked and in need of reinforcement. Developing this awareness by the opportunity to give in a tangible way resonates well with most students who make a doll as a gift for another less fortunate child.

MAKING A UTHANDO DOLL IN THE CLASSROOM

BEFORE YOU COMMENCE DOLL MAKING WITH YOUR STUDENTS THERE ARE SEVERAL IMPORTANT POINTS TO CONSIDER.

- To achieve a good result, this project may take up to a term to complete. Do you have this amount of time to devote to doll making?
- What materials will be required and how can they be sourced?
- What skills will need to be taught to make and dress a doll using fabric?
- How can skills and concepts in many learning areas be incorporated into the project?
- What support from parents and or the wider school community can you call on to assist and guide students to develop the skills necessary to complete a doll well? This is becoming an essential part of achieving a quality result (and peace of mind)!
- Dolls which are not robust enough to withstand vigorous play cannot be sent which is disappointing for all. Therefore it is important that any necessary' quality control' be undertaken by adult assistants before Uthando takes delivery.

THE NATURE OF PLAY

Play is child's work. It is vital for whole balanced growth.

It grows bones, gives eye-hand coordination and builds skills and memory.

It gives language; grammar, rhyming, fun with words, repetition and song.

Play gives you role models, a place in the team, teaches manners, obeying the rules, being first or coming last.

It builds imagination and when you are the one in the middle of the ring, it gives you confidence or a way to cope with disappointment.


It is a way to include new people to be friends or to be discriminating, sometimes hurtful.

There are daring games that scare you and those of quiet being.

Having a doll of your own can give joyful play, security and

cuddles.

In times of grief, confusion and loss, you can express your deepest feelings freely.

DO'S and DON'TS

SOCK CLOTHES

Cut off toe of socie

cut small arm holes C

Cot leg holes

DO fill the doll's body firmly.

DO attach hair firmly all around, not only on top.

DO make clothes that can be removed for play.

DO make a happy face on your doll.

DO include undies on the doll.

DO have fun and be proud of your achievements.

DO give your dolls a special farewell.

DON'T use glue or paint anywhere on the doll.

DON'T ever let a needle or pin get lost inside the doll's body.

DON'T stitch the clothes onto the doll's body.

DON'T use googly eyes or buttons for eyes as they pull off.

DON'T let your doll have a floppy neck.
